A Final Word from Ed

Our departing Scout Executive helped form our illustrious Committee over three years ago. We wanted to learn more about his time before coming to Vermont, while he was here, and what his plans are in retirement. On behalf of the entire council, we wish him well!

From Ed:

I was a Cub Scout for three years and a Boy Scout for three years achieving the rank of First Class. I was up for my Star Board of Review when the Scoutmaster left to organize an Explorer Post and I quickly followed as soon as I turned 14. That was the end of my youth Scouting.

After college I went to work as an Aquatics Director at Camp Karoondinha, the camp where I attended as a Scout. That fall I joined the BSA profession as a District Executive with the Columbia Montour Council in Bloomsburg, Pa. From there I moved to the Susquehanna Council in Williamsport Pa as a Senior District Executive, and 6 years later made the jump to the Samoset Council in Wausau, WI as an Assistant Scout Executive. Six years there and then on to the Bay-Lakes Council in Appleton, WI as a Director of Support Service, where I served for 14 years. I became the Scout Executive in the Green Mountain Council in August of 2010. Ironically, I have never served as a volunteer, until maybe now as I retire from the profession after 42 years.

Vermont is a beautiful state and has been my home for 10 years. Meeting Lainnie, my significant other in 2012 was great as we became one in enjoying the state together and creating our home and me meeting and getting close to her family and now our three granddaughters. We have also enjoyed Lake Champlain, hiked Camel's Hump, explored many of the lakes and beaches and snowshoed some beautiful trails.

If I had to pick one thing that has made me proud to serve as Scout Executive in the Green Mountain Council, it would have to be the people. It is the volunteers in Scouting that truly are the backbone of its success and to see and hear the passion, care and concern they have for this movement is truly amazing. I am very proud to have worked with them every step of the way as we faced our challenges, accepting our failures and celebrating our successes. Those relationships I will miss.

Retirement will be both exciting and a little scary. Exciting because I will have the freedom to move about as I want. A little scary because after 42 years of a pretty busy schedule of nights, weekends and summer camps, I sometimes wonder how my time will be filled. I also plan to continue to work in some capacity but what and where remain somewhat of a mystery. Lainnie and I will still be around for now, sharing our time between Vermont and Florida where we have purchased a home in Parrish, FL, located between Tampa and Sarasota.

As a parting comment to all the Alumni who may take a moment to read this, I leave you with this to remember and ponder. A "Council" is comprised of a geographic territory made up of Scouting units with youth members, volunteer leaders and parents, several volunteer committees and a professional staff that include District Executives, a Scout Executive, Ranger, and an office support staff. **Thus a "Council" is people**.
