## Tales from the Trail



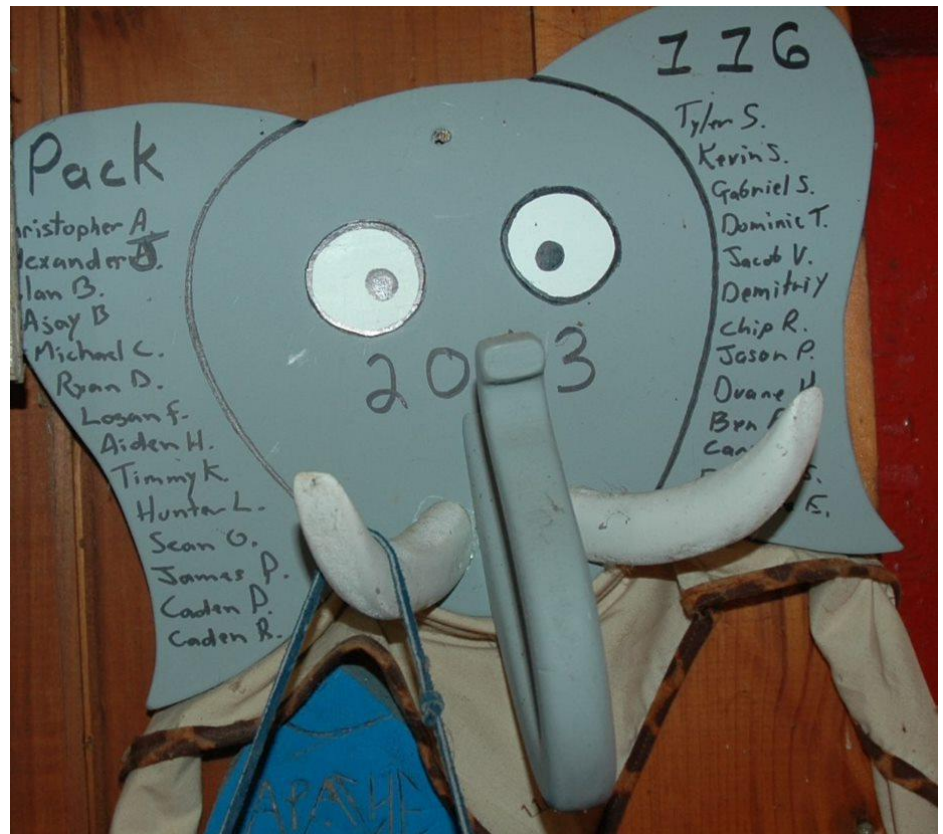

Here is the story of our new logo: Today, a Scout campfire continues to be a place where friendships form, songs are sung, laughter is shared, and lessons are learned. Stories and skits are told and retold, as they have been by generations of America's young people. The new symbol chosen by the Alumni Association of the Boy Scouts of America is: a campfire. It welcomes you to rekindle your relationship with Scouting. Twelve rocks form our fire ring to remind us of our duty to live by the Scout Law, and the circle itself symbolizes the inclusiveness of Scouting. The sticks that burn brightly together remind us of our duty to one other; and like Scouting, the flames are eternal, bringing warmth and light to the world.
