

Scouting Through COVID Top 10 Guidelines for Unit, District, and Council Activities*

With planning, Scouting can be safe during COVID. Staying vigilant and informed are key.

- 1. Communicate with your Chartered Organization to learn what requirements they might have in place, and to engage them in your plan.
- Refer to Vermont's Be Smart, Stay Safe guidance at <u>9.1 Sports/Organized Sports</u>. State officials have permitted our organized Scouting programs to operate provided our leaders uphold all aspects of these changing guidelines.
- 3. In choosing your location, check Section 5 of <u>9.1 Sports/Organized Sports</u> guidance for current facility square footage requirements and maximum participant counts.
- Anyone with COVID-19 symptoms or questionable exposure must stay home. The <u>GMC Pre-Event Screening Checklist</u> is a tool for communicating this to participants, and for documenting compliance.
- 5. The *Checklist* is a <u>required</u> document for District and Council events. Units are encouraged to use this tool, as well.
- 6. Individuals must wear a cloth mask covering nose and mouth when indoors, and outdoors when physical distancing (at least 6 feet between non-family members) cannot be maintained. Those who refuse to comply must leave.
- 7. There must be facilities or supplies to allow for frequent hand washing and/or sanitizing, and frequent reminders to do so.
- 8. Shared equipment and surfaces must be sanitized frequently.
- 9. Camping: tents must be set up 6 feet apart, and each person must have their own tent, unless a family unit. The *Guide to Safe Scouting* applies.
- 10. Dining: Avoid serving styles where diners use shared utensils and condiments; discontinue use of group beverage dispensers.

All must adhere to the guidance provided by the State of Vermont and VT Department of Health.

In the event that a participant tests positive for COVID-19, or if you believe a close contact situation <u>as defined by the CDC</u> has occurred, please:

- Call the Health Department at 802-863-7240 to determine next steps.
- Gather as much information as possible about the situation using the <u>BSA Incident</u> <u>Reporting Tool</u>.
- Notify Scout Executive Mark Saxon at <u>mark.saxon@scouting.org</u> as soon as possible.
- Aid in communicating and reinforcing Health Department and BSA guidance to families until the risk has passed.
